The Parish Council proposal is that as long as the annual Village Green costs are no more than approximately 10% of the PC budget (currently £2500 – £3,000), then no village groups should be charged for its use as this can already be accommodated within the existing budget. Educational budgets are so small that I do not see that there would ever be a reason that the school should ever be charged for use of the village green. I would also like to see the Village Green WG make all efforts possible to connect with the village's residents/local community groups to ensure maintenance costs are kept to a minimum through voluntary support for maintenance in the same way that such community involvement maintains the maze area. The cricket club should be responsible for the maintenance costs relating to the wicket square and the football club should be responsible for maintaining the goals at the top of the green.

The school's Sports Day used to be held on grass within the school grounds. I note that they now hold Sports Day on the VG, presumably as the grass within the school grounds was astroturfed. The astroturf was provided specifically so the children had an all-weather surface for football, other games and outdoor activities. I think it should be remembered that organised and constructed/artificial play areas tend to destroy even when the intention is to enhance opportunities for play and sport, especially when you take the long view. Also I feel that in principle the VG should be for the residents of Whitchurch. With both these points in mind the schedule for school use ought to place some restriction on the amount of time allocated to the school and on the extent to which sports equipment is installed on the VG. Q.5 Yes, to the occasional social event sponsored by one or more local groups. No to picnics in a general sense. Q.9 On charging: First, the long-standing use by the Cricket Club and any agreements made with them should be adhered to. Second, whatever was agreed between the school and

the PC, should not have been agreed if it gave them free use, especially as they already have the school grounds to play in and not all the children are Whitchurch residents. Third, with those two groups not paying, it is not reasonable that the football club or any other club be required to pay? If charging is an unacceptable option, and PC precept proves to be inadequate, other worthwhile options include: Voluntary maintenance work by users, Fund-raising, and Voluntary contributions which might be forthcoming, if the various groups and clubs were approached in the right way.

I do not think that children should be charged for using the village green (for any school activity, or sport)- as children should be encouraged to exercise and play outside. I think that adult groups should be charged- but this could be monetary or they could provide services instead (eg cutting grass, maintaining trees etc). The village green annual charges will go up when the pavilion is built (maintenance of this building, cleaning etc), and so I think the adult clubs will need to make a contribution (monetary or services) to assist in paying for and up-keeping these facilities.

As many cricketers are from outside the village it does not seem justified for village residents to be required to provide everything free for their benefit. The cricket club apparently pays to use the nets at Bradfield. And Jenny Welham told us that all other local communities make a charge to sports clubs for use of community-owned grounds. When the village is asked to contribute to a pavilion fund it may seem unfair that the principal users of the pavilion make no contribution to the village green maintenance costs. That is one argument. However, I don't know exactly what was agreed in the deal to acquire the green (does anyone?). And it may be that generous private contributions from members of the cricket club to the pavilion fund will outweigh the argument above. And it also may be the case that individual members of the cricket club generously mowing the green without charge will also outweigh it.

The wording of 1 does not make it clear whether £2500-£3000 is the budget in total or 10% of the budget. Assuming that it's the latter, as the space has to be maintained whether or not the clubs use it, it seems reasonable that as long as they don't do anything which costs extra money that they should not be charged. I would also agree that anyone (including the cricket and football clubs) using the VG for profit should pay for its use. I would hope that the scope of the agreement with the school would be such that hardly anything they would be likely to do would attract a charge. I've always felt that the school and field are part of the same "package". There has been discussion in Henley where fitness trainers have used the area around the rowing museum for profit making activities, but paid nothing. Things like that may need to be considered if a fitness trail or other equipment is installed.

I can only comment on behalf of my time at the cricket club on the committee and as a Parish Councillor at the time of the sale of the ground. It was never Miles Whitlock's intention (Miles Whitlock was the owner of the land before selling to Whitchurch PC) that the cricket club would have to pay to use "his ground" to play cricket. If the cricket club can provide some maintenance to the square and the outfield then they should not be charged for its use.
